[American Red Cross](#) is a humanitarian organization led by volunteers and guided by its congressional charter and the Fundamental Principles of the International Red Cross Movement. It will provide relief to victims of disasters and help people prevent, prepare for, and respond to emergencies.

[Association of Contingency Planners](#) (ACP) is a non-profit trade association dedicated to fostering continued professional growth and development in effective Contingency & Business Resumption Planning. Contingency planning is a required element for successful business and government agencies. Emergency managers and business continuity planners alike address mitigation, response and recovery planning issues. The purpose of ACP is to provide an environment for the exchange of experiences and information. This includes identification of common planning needs and potential recovery response solutions as well as networking opportunities through local and national alliances.

[Bureau of Diplomatic Security](#) is responsible for providing a safe and secure environment for the conduct of U.S. foreign policy. Part of the U.S. Department of State, every diplomatic mission in the world operates under a security program designed and maintained by Diplomatic Security. In the United States, Diplomatic Security investigates passport and visa fraud, conducts personnel security investigations, and protects the Secretary of State and high-ranking foreign dignitaries and officials visiting the United States. Diplomatic Security trains foreign civilian law enforcement officers in disciplines designed to reduce the threat and repercussions of terrorism throughout the world.

[Critical Infrastructure Protection Program](#) seeks to fully integrate the disciplines of law, policy, and technology for enhancing the security of cyber-networks, physical systems and economic processes supporting the nation's critical infrastructures. The CIP Program received initial funding in 2002 from The National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST). As the project expanded, on-going activities were leveraged to generate new funding that expanded the project scope to address unexplored areas of critical infrastructure protection. By 2004, the project had evolved into a family of projects under the overall umbrella of the CIP Program. The CIP Program is a joint effort of George Mason University School of Law and James Madison University. Over the course of the last two years, the CIP Program has sponsored interdisciplinary and multi-institutional research within 11 different academic units at GMU and at 14 universities nationwide, funding a total of 77 professors and over 200 research assistants and students.

[Department of Homeland Security](#) (DHS) protects the Nation against terrorist attacks. DHS is dedicated to achieving this goal while allowing for the free flow of people, goods, and commerce across our borders and through our airports and seaports. Component agencies will analyze threats and intelligence, guard our borders and airports, protect our critical infrastructure, and coordinate the response of our Nation for future emergencies. DHS is also dedicated to protecting the rights of American citizens and enhancing public services, such as natural disaster assistance and citizenship services, by dedicating offices to these important missions.

[Disaster Recovery Information Exchange](#) (DRIE) is a not-for-profit organization dedicated to the promotion of Business Resumption Planning, Computer Recovery Planning, Crisis Management and other related disciplines as integral components of an effective business strategy. DRIE was founded in Toronto in 1985 by a small group of disaster recovery planners to exchange ideas and information about their organizations' recovery planning efforts. Initially, meetings dealt strictly

with the recovery of Data Centres. The focus gradually shifted towards business recovery and continuity planning.

[Emergency E-Mail Network](#) has a mission to provide notification to citizens of local, regional, national and international emergencies utilizing the Internet and electronic mail (email) in a secure and expedient manner

[EPA National Homeland Security Research Center](#) (NHSRC) as part of the Office of Research and Development (ORD), manages, coordinates and supports a wide variety of homeland security research and technical assistance efforts. Research at the Center will focus on developing methods to clean up contaminated buildings (the Safe Building Program), protecting the Nation's drinking water supply (the Water Protection Program), and improving risk assessment techniques (the Rapid Risk Assessment Program).

[Federal Emergency Management Agency](#) (FEMA) is a government agency whose mission is to lead the effort to prepare the nation for all hazards and effectively manage federal response and recovery efforts following any national incident. FEMA also initiates proactive mitigation activities, trains first responders, and manages the National Flood Insurance Program and the U.S. Fire Administration. On March 1, 2003, FEMA became part of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS).

[FEMA Mapping and Analysis Center](#) (MAC) provides national level Geographic Information System (GIS) support and coordination to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). This site is limited to presidential declared disasters and tropical storms/hurricanes that have projected landfall on the U.S. or a territory.

[Forum of Incident Response and Security Teams](#) FIRST is the premier organization and recognized global leader in incident response. Membership in FIRST enables incident response teams to more effectively respond to security incidents reactive as well as proactive. FIRST brings together a variety of computer security incident response teams from government, commercial, and educational organizations. FIRST aims to foster cooperation and coordination in incident prevention, to stimulate rapid reaction to incidents, and to promote information sharing among members and the community at large. FIRST is an international confederation of trusted computer incident response teams who cooperatively handle computer security incidents and promote incident prevention program.

[Government Emerging Technology Alliance](#) (GETA) was born after 9/11 as a division of the National Small Business Council, Inc. (NSBC), a non-profit membership organization with deep roots in the federal technology industry. GETA's commitment to their work stems from their sincere belief that the on-going, rapid integration of new technology is indispensable in sustaining the American way of life. GETA's programs are designed to bring together our very dedicated government workforce with the World's most innovative and responsive vendor community for the benefit of all peaceful citizens of the World.

[Homeland Protection Institute](#) (HPI) is a nonprofit organization with a mission to serve the public interest by spurring the rapid development and deployment of needed research applications and to address critical related policy, information management and education and training issues, so as to enhance homeland security, liberty, prosperity and sustainability. HPI's principal focus is on multiple use research applications that detect, provide early warning, and enable the effective

[Homeland Security Industries Association](#) (HSIA) is a non-profit corporation established in August 2002. Its mission is to provide a mechanism for government and the private sector to coordinate on a wide range of homeland security issues.

[Homeland Security Institute](#) (HSI) is a Studies and Analysis Federally Funded Research and Development Center. The HSI delivers independent and objective analyses and advises in core areas important to its sponsor in support of policy development, decision-making, analysis of alternative approaches, and evaluation of new ideas on issues of significance. HSI is operated by Analytic Services Inc under a government contract. The primary mission of the HSI is to assist the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and its Operating Elements in addressing important homeland security issues, particularly those requiring scientific, technical, and analytical expertise. The DHS Under Secretary for Science and Technology is responsible for managing the HSI.

[Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments](#) (COG) is a regional organization of Washington area local governments. COG is composed of 19 local governments surrounding the nation's capital, plus area members of the Maryland and Virginia legislatures, the U.S. Senate, and the U.S. House of Representatives. COG provides a focus for action and develops sound regional responses to such issues as the environment, affordable housing, economic development, health and family concerns, human services, population growth, public safety, and transportation. COG's ongoing public safety efforts include law enforcement, fire protection and disaster and emergency preparedness.

[National Emergency Management Association](#) (NEMA) is a professional association of state, pacific and Caribbean insular state emergency management directors committed to: Providing national leadership and expertise in comprehensive emergency management; Serving as a vital information and assistance resource for state and territorial directors and their governors; and Forging strategic partnerships to advance continuous improvements in emergency management.

[Office for Domestic Preparedness](#) (ODP) is the principal component of the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) responsible for preparing the United States for acts of terrorism. In carrying out its mission, ODP is responsible for providing training, funds for the purchase of

equipment, support for the planning and execution of exercises, technical assistance and other support to assist states and local jurisdictions to prevent, respond to, and recover from acts of terrorism. ODP achieves its mission by providing grants to states and local jurisdictions, providing hands-on training through a number of residential training facilities and in-service training at the local level, funding and working with state and local jurisdictions to plan and execute exercises, and providing technical assistance on-site to state and local jurisdictions.

[Overseas Security Advisory Council](#) (OSAC) is a Federal Advisory Committee with a U.S. Government Charter to promote security cooperation between American business and private sector interests worldwide and the U.S. Department of State as well as other US Government Agencies. OSAC currently encompasses the 34-member core Council, an Executive Office, over 100 Country Councils, and more than 2,700 constituent member organizations, 600 associates and 5 US Government Agencies (US Agency for International Development, US Chamber of Commerce, US Department of Commerce, US Department of Treasury). The increase in terrorism over the last 25 years and the continuing threat against U.S. interests overseas has forced many American companies to seek advice and assistance from the U.S. Government, particularly the State Department. In 1985, a handful of chief executive officers from prominent American companies met with then Secretary of State George P. Shultz to promote cooperation between the American private sector worldwide and the U.S. Government on security issues. The subsequent establishment of the Overseas Security Advisory Council (OSAC) has developed into an enormously successful joint venture. Today over 2,700 U.S. companies, educational institutions, religious and non-governmental organizations are constituents of OSAC. The Council provides a forum for best practices and provides the tools needed to cope with today's ever-changing challenges and security-related issues abroad.

[Public Relations Society of America](#) (PRSA) is the world's largest organization for public relations professionals. With the vision to unify, strengthen and advance the profession of public relations, the Public Relations Society of America (PRSA) has established itself as the pre-eminent organization that builds value, demand and global understanding for public relations. PRSA conducts research on subjects such as Crisis Management" or "Internal Communications"
