



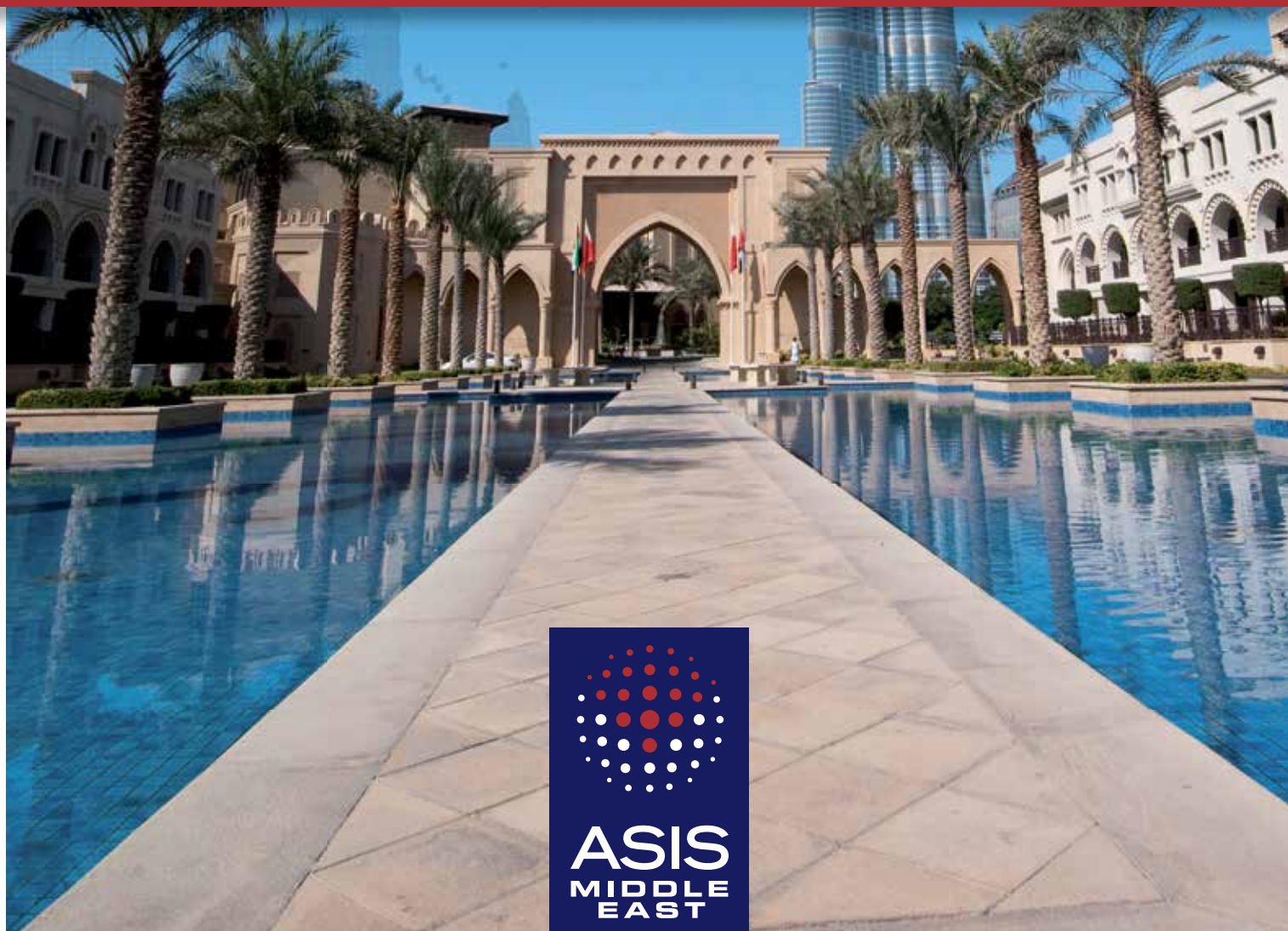

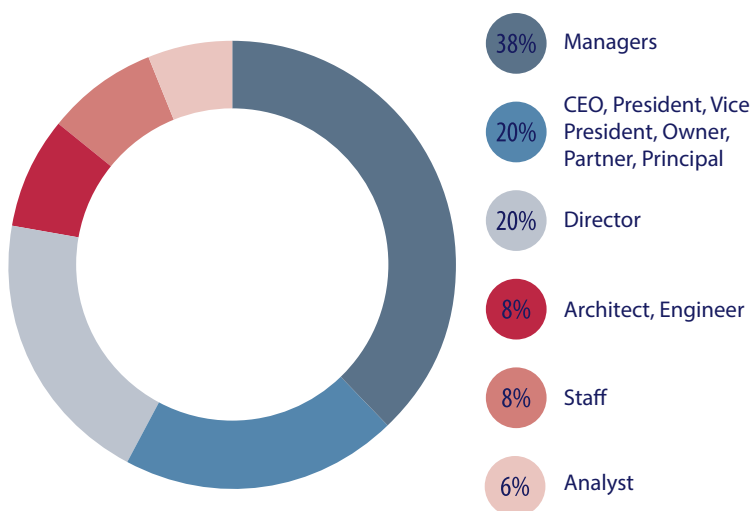

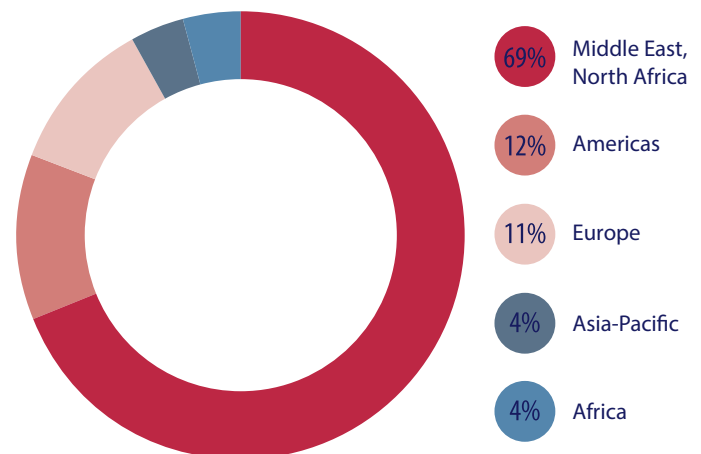

Mohammad G. Al-Zahrani

Vice President of Safety & Industrial Security, Saudi Aramco, KSA

Mohammad Al-Zahrani started his career in 1974 working as an Oil & Gas Operator and later a Supervising Operator in various Producing Departments within Saudi Aramco. In 1985 he earned his Bachelors degree in Petroleum Engineering at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette and worked as a Petroleum Engineer and later a Production Engineering Supervisor for various onshore and offshore production facilities. He was appointed President and CEO of Saudi Aramco subsidiary Aramco Gulf Operations Co (AGOC) in Khafji in May 2006 and was named General Manager of Drilling in September 2008. In May 2009 he was appointed as Executive Director, Safety & Industrial Security (S&IS) and 3 years later, in May 2012, became the Vice President of S&IS. In his current role of Vice President, he is responsible for several security departments, namely, Loss Prevention, Fire Protection, Industrial Security Operations, Corporate Security & Traffic Safety.



Lady Olga Maitland

President of Defence and Security Forum, UK

Lady Olga Maitland has a broad experience on the impact of terrorism especially on corporates. She launched DSF in 1983 to counter the effects of the anti-nuclear protest movement. Since then she has traveled widely into areas affected by terrorism and has a good grasp on how militant groups function. She is also Chairman of the Algeria British Business Council, Non-executive director MidCost Oil and Gas Ltd, Consultant to Marbella International University, and Chairman of Copenhagen Compliance. Prior to this she was British Member of Parliament in 1992 – 1997 during which time she served as Parliamentary Private Secretary to Rt. Hon.Sir John Wheeler, Minister of State, Northern Ireland Office with special responsibility for counter terrorism. She began her career as a journalist first as a columnist with the Sunday Express newspaper, then the Daily Mail. She also broadcast frequently on radio and television. Today she is a regular speaker at corporate and security conferences.

His Excellency Dr. Khalid bin Sa'ad Al Ageel

Secretary General of the Higher Commission for Industrial Security (HCIS), KSA

Dr. Khalid bin Sa'ad Al Ageel is the General Secretary of the Higher Commission for Industrial Security in the Ministry of Interior of The Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. He is involved in planning, designing and implementing all strategies, policies and processes related to industrial security for the National Infrastructure Facilities in Saudi Arabia. An expert in the field of Industrial Security, His research interests include innovations in industrial security and process engineering. Dr. Khalid has an M.Sc. and a Ph.D. in Chemical and Process Engineering from the University of Sheffield and a B.Sc. in Industrial Engineering from King Saud University.



His Excellency Major General Khamis Mattar Al Muzainah

Commander-in-Chief, Dubai Police, UAE

Well known for his high professionalism, Maj Gen Al Muzainah has many outstanding accomplishments in the field of police and security work. He first joined the Dubai Police Force in 1983. In 1993, he was appointed narcotics division officer, at the General Department of Criminal Investigation followed by a promotion in 1997 to Director – CID Department. In 1999 he assumed the position of deputy director general, Gen. Dept. of Criminal Investigation, a department of which he became the director general in 2004. In 2008 Khamis Mattar Al Muzainah was appointed deputy Commandant General of Dubai Police. On 23/11/2013, His Highness Sheikh Mohammad Bin Rashid Al Maktoum, Vice-President, Prime Minister of the UAE, in his capacity as ruler of Dubai, issued a decree appointing HE Expert Major-General Khamis Mattar Al Muzainah as the Commander-in-chief of Dubai Police.



Professor Peter D'Arcy

Former Government Advisor to the MOIDirector of the Government-owned National Security Institute, UAE

Professor Peter D'Arcy has spent the past 40 years in a variety of government roles. He started his career in January 1973 with the Metropolitan Police in London. He became a Detective in 1975 and served at New Scotland Yard until 1980. He took time out to attend Law School and graduated in 1984. Prof. D'Arcy went on to take post-graduate studies at the Institute for Advanced Legal Studies, the London School of Economics and St. Andrews University, in Scotland. A highlight of his working career involved being a founding member of the Anti-Terrorist Branch in London. After moving to Canada, he worked as an Analyst for VICLAS, the Canadian Federal Police version of the FBI's Behavioral Science Unit. Prof. D'Arcy was also assigned to the Historical Homicide Unit in British Columbia, and was later re-assigned as Coordinator of Police Advanced Training Programs at the Justice Institute of British Columbia where he was responsible for the advanced police training of 13 Municipal and City Police Forces.

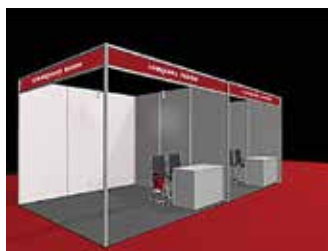
