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## Managing Public Safety Issues, Not Creating Them

Many organizations adopt what they consider to be a holistic approach to public safety management. However, in some instances, they only consider the overt management issues and fail to account for the issues that underlie their implementation. The result may be a generally effective management system, but not one that constitutes a best practice. Indeed, such frameworks may introduce unintended negative consequences by failing to manage the wider range of potential risk exposures. However, by adopting an ontology-based approach, organizations can develop a model that not only defines issues, but enables them to better manage these issues by analyzing how potential elements interrelate within an operational hierarchy.

Based on my professional experience, there are three layers of issues that should be considered when discussing the ontology of public safety management.

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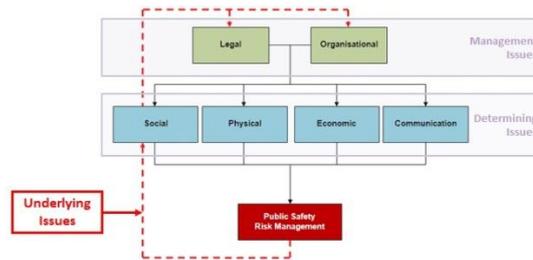
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As seen in the figure above, the first layer is management issues that identify whether a public-safety management strategy will be a best practice in terms of community characteristics. As this suggests, these issues are the "coal face" considerations that have the primary function of enabling the matching of risk management strategies with the demographics and public safety needs of respective communities.

The second level is that of determining issues that influence whether public-safety management strategies will be best practices in terms of organizational characteristics. These issues constitute a pivotal layer of considerations and will determine the manner in which the previous management issues will be addressed through the provision of an administrative framework.

The third level, underlying issues, are underpinning dynamics that may influence the actual impact and control of the former, essentially completing the management loop. Underlying issues are the final and most crucial layer of considerations involved in public safety management. As covert issues, these elements underpin the key determining issues and have a potentially significant impact on the overall risk management cycle. These issues will define the micro and macro cultural environments in which the determining and management issues are to be addressed, and form the contextual foundation on which public safety management systems will be based. These issues, however, are most often overlooked, and are the crux of the argument for an ontology-based approach as they direct us to consider the wider impacts, intended or otherwise, of our risk mitigations.

Whilst organizations usually develop and implement their public safety management frameworks based on management- and determining-level issues, the remaining underlying issues often go unnoticed, with organizations focusing on managing the perceived threats rather than the overall consequences -- be they positive or negative in nature - that result from risk mitigations.

The implications of this can be significant in terms of physical and social impacts. However, it can be argued that by adopting an ontology-based approach, organizations can develop a model that not only defines these issues, but also the relationships between them, enabling organizations to understand and navigate the same.

## Headlines

### Security Measures Stepped Up in Shanghai after Terrorist Attack

ECNS reported on March 3 that security measures have been raised to their highest level following the terrorist attack that took place on March 1 at Kunming Railway Station.

Eight assailants armed with knives and machetes stormed the station on March 1, killing 29 people and injuring 143 others.

At the city's rail stations, security checks will be stepped up at entrances to prevent anyone from entering with dangerous items. Armed police will also be in patrol at all the stations. Moreover, Shanghai will undergo strict antiterrorist checks where large crowds are expected to gather.

Finally, airport security will also be tightened. Passengers will be asked to open carry-on luggage more frequently and to take out portable mobile-phone battery chargers and other electronic devices from their bags during security checks.

## China Expected to Tighten Cybersecurity

*The New York Times* reported that Chinese President Xi Jinping will lead a working group on cybersecurity and information security aimed at drafting national strategies and developing policies in these fields. The announcement did not offer details about what will be covered but, according to *The New York Times*, demonstrates that the Communist Party sees the issue as one of its main concerns.

During the past year, cybersecurity has been one of the thorniest issues in the nation's relationship with the United States. China has claimed that it is also victim of cyberattacks and, according to the author, wants to demonstrate that it is taking the issue seriously. China is now the world's second-largest economy and has more than 600 million Internet users -- the largest number worldwide.

## Australian Privacy Law Goes into Effect

The Privacy Amendment Bill 2012 took effect March 12, *Australian Security Magazine* reports. It is aimed at replacing the previous version of the legislation, introduced in 1988, to become more in line with modern issues such as cloud computing and the use of personal devices to share information and documents in the workplace.

Under the new law, the definition of personal information will be broadened and will encapsulate data types that were not considered as personal in 1988. The new law will apply to any companies with revenues of more than AUD \$3 million that collect information such as names, contact details, payment information, or other details related to a specific person, for any purpose.

Moreover, Australian organizations will have to be more transparent and responsive about how they are handling customer data. If data is stored in the cloud, additional requirements will apply. Organizations will need to know on whose servers in which countries their information is stored so that they can be completely transparent with their customers and can remain compliant at all times.

Failure to comply with the new law means organizations can be hit with fines of up to AUD \$1.7 million.

## Speculation Rife Over Missing Malaysia Airlines Flight

According to *The Guardian*, a new theory has emerged as regards the missing Malaysia Airlines plane.

The last sighting of the aircraft on civilian radar came less than an hour after taking off from Kuala Lumpur. However, two people in the United States familiar with the details, said U.S. investigators suspected the Boeing 777 stayed in the air for about four hours past that time. Flight MH370 from Kuala Lumpur to Beijing went missing on March 7, with 239 passengers and crew on board. The disappearance has led to massive speculation over what might have caused the plane to vanish from radar screens. Authorities have considered hijacking, sabotage, psychological or personal problems among crew or passengers.

Confusion even reigned over whether the plane involved was subject to a safety alert from the U.S. Federal Aviation Administration about cracks possibly developing in the fuselage around a satellite antenna. The FAA said the alert had been sent to 777 operators and was relevant to MH370 but Boeing told Reuters the Malaysia Airlines plane did not have the antenna and was unaffected.
